The point of the workshop is to introduce you to the process of editing and producing a literary magazine, to stimulate your interest and experience in producing literary journalism, critical prose that is neither a consumer's report nor an academic essay, and to help sharpen your sense of what and when to publish. Your tasks will be both editorial and critical: they will involve reading and evaluating work coming into the portal of *StoryQuarterly* and sharing those evaluations week by week with the workshop, in open session. You will also write between 3 and 6 reviews during the term, initially of three assigned texts in the three major genres. Later on I will encourage you to review a book of your own choosing. Along the way we will discuss differences among the genres, with particular attention to that mythical entity, non-fiction, as well as sub-genres (flash fiction, the prose poem, poetic prose).

Assignments:

- Reviews: You will be required to produce five critical reviews of books—works of fiction, non-fiction, poetry, a textbook or anthology, and two books of your choice. Each will be distributed to the class through the class listserve and selectively workshopped. A description of the reviews will be announced and circulated along with models that demonstrate the expected length and style.
- From the Slush: You will produce and post your reactions to stories that enter the *StoryQuarterly* portal. The work will come to you anonymized and will be sent to the workshop as gang-emails. You will be asked to read and comment on each in some detail.
- <u>Style</u>: You wil produce two stylistic exercises during the course of the term based on models to be distributed later.
- <u>Presentations:</u> At some point you will be expected to lead a conversation about a particular magazine or journal you find especially suited to what you are writing.

NB: Assignments must be delivered either in hard copy to the workshop on the day of class or, preferably, twenty-four hours in advance, through the class listsery: <u>MFA-publishing</u> <u>@camden.rutgers.edu</u>. Assignments and reviews should be available to the class with sufficient lead-time to permit perusal and printout before the next meeting.

My final assessment of your work will be based on the following proportions:

•	6 Reviews:	60%
•	5 Evaluations of <i>SQ</i> Slush:	30%
•	2 Stylistic Exercises	5%
•	Presentations	5%

Additional expectations and procedures

- Comportment: Refrain from using laptops during class for any reason, including note-taking.
